- 1. Teachers teaching classes 10, 11 and 12 reported back on Friday, 5.1.2018 after their winter vacation.

- 19. A concert by the renowned musician, Dr Grace Baek for the students of Junior School, followed by a music class for Prep School was conducted on 23.1.2018.


New Addition of Books in the Library

II LANGUAGE POEM RECITATION COMPETITION

On 30th August 2017, Prep-School organized a II-language inter-house poetry recitation competition. The heterogeneous competition included renditions in French, Hindi, and Tamil. Approximately 60 students participated in the competition with immense enthusiasm and brio. The competition was set about with French poetry recitation competition followed by Hindi and Tamil. As rightly held, poems are extremely important in a child's literacy growth - are vital for language development, cognitive development, and social/emotional development in children. The participants came up with some of the famous and melodious poems in all the three languages. The recital excelled in rhythm, voice inflection, pitch, mood, diction, pattern, sequence, expressions, and overall brilliant oral skills with a spur of feelings!

The final judgement in each competition was extremely difficult for the judges.

Results: In the French competition, Niharika Singhal of Aravalli house was adjudged the first. She certainly excelled in her command of the poetic recital of " je m'appelle Hélène". Second in succession was, Jiya Mann P. from Sumeru, who gave a mellifluous delivery of a school poem, " Ça y est,. Je suis grand! Third in lead was Anu Sajeev of Vindya house with another melodious recitation.







We live in a world in which being gregarious and outgoing is the most highly valued currency. This can be a rocky road for quiet kids, all the more so because of today's school culture.



Psychology defines these 'quiet' kids (and also adults) as introverts. Introverts are people who like to think, feel and listen. They require private time and are observant, while their opposites, extroverts, crave people and activity.

Society often overloads introverts. We idolise the talkers. But this doesn't mean one personality is better than the other. Thousands of psychological experiments tell us that introverts and extroverts think, feel, talk and live better with each other since their differences complement each other. Hence, we must have a feeling of inclusion towards introversions and we must support introverts right from their time at school.

Judging students on classroom participation ultimately results in higher grades for highly vocal students, which is discriminating against the introvert kids.

In a bid to harness the secret strengths of introverts, schools from around the world are trying to 'quietize' their curriculum; classroom participation is being replaced by classroom engagement, where students are divided in small groups, so that students who feel vulnerable speaking in front of the whole class can voice their opinion among small groups of peers.

A concept called 'think time' is also spreading among educators. Such teachers allow some time after asking a question, so that introverts can think and develop a comfortable answer.

A similar technique is think/pair/share, in which students first sit quietly and think, then express their ideas to a peer on small group. Only then do they turn to the whole class.

Such techniques allow introverts to gather courage and also help in slowly expanding their audience.

33-50% of the world consists of introverts, Let us not ask them to change, but include them in our lives. This can only begin with such a quiet revolution in classrooms.
