
The Blessing / Dedication of the Colour 6th September 1949

- 1. On 6th September 1949 (Founder's Day) the King's Colour was trooped [at the Top Flat] and with the Band Playing 'Auld Lang Syne', the Escort and Colour marched off in slow time down the line of Guards. This was the School's farewell to the Old Colour. The old was then cased and subsequently laid to rest in the Large Hall.
- 2. The Principal, Mr Suraj Bhan (First Indian Principal of Lovedale) then handed the Colour to the First Indian Governor of Madras, His Excellency Colonel Maharaja Raol Sir Shri Krishna Kumarsinhji Bhavsinhji, KCSI*, [who was the Maharaja of Bhavnagar], for presentation and Prefect Ralph Transfield received the Colour from him sinking on his right knee.
- 3. The new Indian Union Colour was then uncased and laid across the drums and dedicated by:-
 - Swami Ojasananda Sri, Ramakrishna Ashram, Ootacamund
 - Rev. C.F. Ash, Principal, St. George's Home, Ketti
 - Rev. Fr. P. Crayssac, Priest, St. Anthony's Church, Lovedale
 - Mir Mohammed Yahya, Ex-Imam, Jama Masjid, Ootacamund

The Indian Union Colour now took the place of the King's Colour.



The 3rd Round was based on General Awareness in the IT field.


The 4thRound of quizzing revolved around software and web sites. The Quiz concluded with the nail-biting Rapid Fire round.

A TRIP TO DAMAN – THE INDIAN WEST COAST

Pondering over what I did for my birthday this year, 6th of July, I remembered my parents had planned an extended weekend getaway to Daman.

Just like Goa, Daman is famous for its beaches, old buildings (Portuguese influence), churches and for the photographic twin towns of Nani-Daman (Nani meaning small) and Moti-Daman (Moti meaning big), which lie across on opposite banks of Daman Ganga River. Contrary to the literal meanings, Nani-Daman is the larger of the two parts, while the old city is mainly Moti-Daman. The downtown area is the soul of the city with major hospitals, supermarkets, and major residential areas.

Portugal is the connection between Goa and Daman, as Goa, Daman, and Diu were once under Portuguese occupation. Diogo de Melo, a Portuguese, arrived at the spot by chance in 1523. He was caught in a violent storm and had his boat blown towards the coast of Daman. Soon after it became a Portuguese colony which lasted for four centuries till December 1961 which is when it became part of the Indian Republic. One glaring difference between Goa and Daman is its enormous Gujarati speaking population unlike Goa. Daman has a tropical savannah climate with two distinct climates a hot and dry summer season and very humid and extremely wet monsoon season.

The Portuguese built Moti Daman Fort in the 16th century to guard against the Mughals. It holds the ruins of a Dominican monastery and Basilica of 'Born Jesus Church,' known for its gilt altarpiece, which was completed in 1603. Today the fort is home to municipal government offices and residences for their staff

The Lighthouse offers a magnificent view of the sunset. It is a major landmark of the town and offers views over the Arabian Sea. The only regret I have is I could not take a photograph of the breathtaking view as I had forgotten my camera in the hotel room but happy that I will cherish the spectacular view in my memories forever.






